The depiction portrays a New York City with a subtle futuristic touch. In this society, it is customary for children to possess "kiddie handsets," (Egan, 313), which are smartphones specifically tailored for their use. Nevertheless, Alex and his wife are in agreement that their "daughter will not be granted a kiddie handset until she reaches the age of five" (Egan, 313).

Alex and his wife support the "childhood at risk" argument "emphasizes inherent vulnerabilities in childhood" as well as adult responsibility for children, "exploiting parental fear...{and} delaying traditional milestones of adulthood" (craft,176). Alex deliberately limits



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his child's access to digital gadgets, demonstrating his belief that he is safeguarding his child by restricting her use of these "kiddie handsets". Alex perceives both of his children as susceptible and regards technology as menacing. Alex's desire to shield his child from mobile devices reflects his belief in the responsibility of parents, including himself, to preserve the traditional concept of childhood that existed before the advent of digital entertainment and communication. When Alex's mobile device vibrates, his daughter indicates his pocket and declares, "That's mine!" This leads Alex to ponder "whether it is feasible for his daughter to perceive the vibrations through his body" (Egan, 321). The use of the term "mine" indicates that the daughter considers the device as her own, suggesting that these mobile devices are essential to a child's sense of self, possession, and overall experience of childhood.

Egan skillfully portrays a relatable moment for parents through Alex's interaction with his daughter, simultaneously asserting that the integration of digital communication devices into childhood has already taken place. In Egan's "Pure Language," the societal structure highlights the role of children in the market, revealing the generation divide between young people and adults and emphasizing the influence that children acquire through digital devices. In Egan's world, children are referred to as "pointers" because they possess the ability to download music simply by pointing, thus making them the ultimate "judges of musical success" (Egan, 313).

In "Pure Language," Egan constructs a world where the internet and electronic devices pose as menacing entities, thereby asserting that these technologies also possess destructive qualities within our society. However, it is not only children who are put at risk by these devices.

Children, unlike adults, are not alienated by the presence of technology in their lives. Instead, they grow and learn alongside these technological advancements, such as the internet and smartphones. As a result, children are aware of the positive and negative aspects of these technologies and are able to utilise them to their full potential.
